PREFACE TO 1916 EDITION.

IN presenting a further edition the editor desires to express his gratification in the measure of support he has received from his subscribers in the earlier issues, and trusts that as the work becomes better known, in reference, he may expect an increased patronage from the public at large.

At least one object of the book is perhaps best expressed by the following extract from a letter to the editor from Dr. Alexander Fraser, the Ontario Archivist: "The object of your book is not to furnish a medium for the gratification of those who may appear on its pages so much as to supply the public and posterity with a true record of Canadians who have merited distinction at the hands of their Sovereign or of the public, because of public service."

The editor's chief incentive in undertaking this work was to pay a tribute to the memory of his father, whose authority as a constitutional writer and adviser was well established throughout the British Empire. But the knowledge of that fact was confined mainly to parliamentarians. In connection therewith this interesting incident has just been received from Mr. J. E. B. McCready of Prince Edward Island: "When I was serving as a clerk to the Committee on the Administration of Justice in the District of Ottawa, the Committee being composed of the great lawyers, with John Hilyard Cameron as chairman, and when I got for them from the library the books bearing upon impeachments, Sir John Macdonald took in his hand one of your father's books, and turning to the Hon. Edward Blake said, 'Blake, we think we know a little law, but we would be utterly at a loss how to proceed in the present case but for this book written by a layman.'"

The purport of this book is to publish biographies both of deceased and living persons which opens the way to receive the records of eminent men who have passed away; such, combined with the many historical facts developed in the lineages, should prove of increasing interest to present and future generations.

And in addition the editor wishes to identify and preserve the armorial bearings of such families as possess them, having qualified himself by years of study and practice.

The editor has received much kind assistance from his brother, Lieutenant-Colonel A. H. Todd and Colonel de la C. T. Irwin, C.M.G., of Ottawa; Major E. M. Chadwick, K.C., of Toronto; and Mr. W. D. Schuyler-Lighthall, K.C., of Montreal.

PUBLISHER'S NOTE.

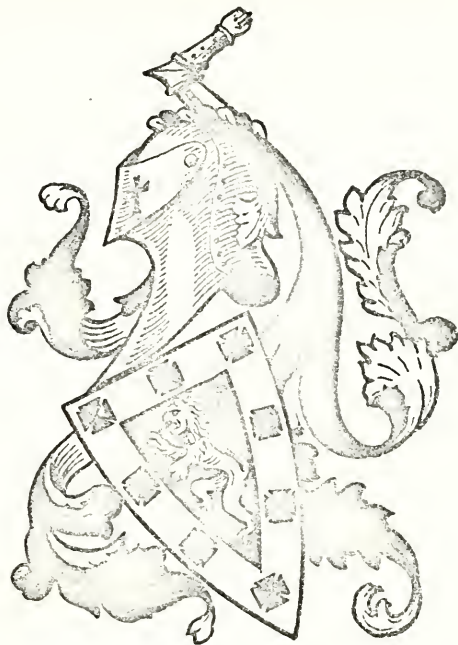
The preservation of family lineages including the historical incidents connected therewith amounts to a real duty even to the present generation, but doubly so to the coming one.

Family events which are known to one generation may easily be entirely lost to the next through carelessness or lack of foresight in not preserving them in written form.

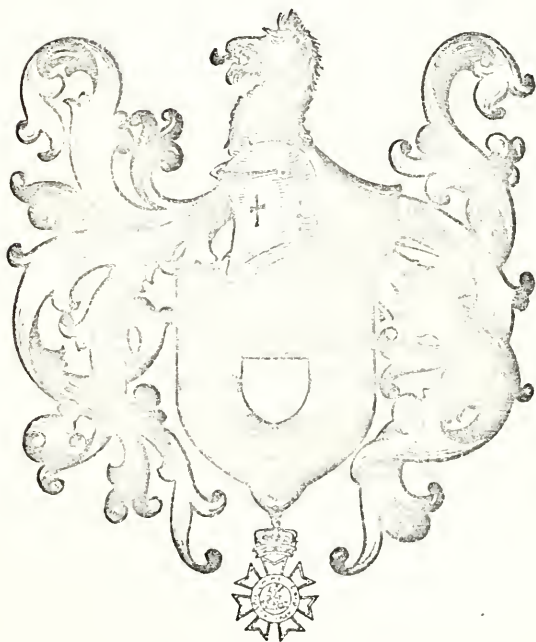
The publishing of a biography, however brief, is the most practical method of honouring the memory of parents.

Cockshutt of Brantford.

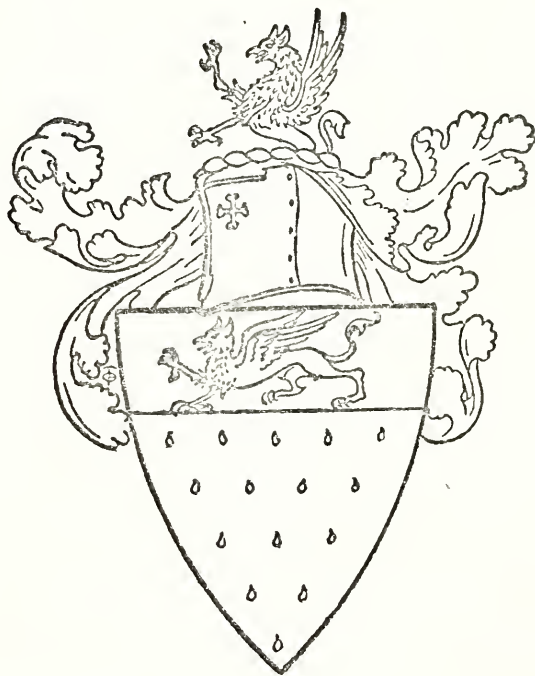
WILLIAM FOSTER COCKSHUTT (*), M. P., born Brantford Ont., 17 Oct., 1855. Member for Brantford 1904-8, and 1911; merchant; manufacturer; Ex-president, Cockshutt Plow Co., Member Electric Power Commission of Ontario; six times delegate to the Chamber of Commerce of the Empire; fifteen years member Council of Toronto Board of Trade, on directorate of several companies. Chairman, Laycock Ophanage; Member Executive Synod of Huron, and of General Synod.

He married, April 8, 1891, Minnie Turner, daughter of the Rev. Robert Ashton (and Alice Turner of London, England). Principal of the Mohawk Institute of Brantford. Issue,

- sons—1. William Ashton; born July 28, 1892; was Lieutenant in the 103d Calgary Rifles when the war broke out. He enlisted early in August, 1914, and went to the front with the first contingent; was wounded near Ypres on June 7, 1915, was invalided to Canada, and after six months convalescence he joined up with the 125th Battalion and went back a second time as Major. His health finally was affected, and he was discharged from the service in 1918.
2. George Turner; born February 17, 1894; was Lieutenant in the 38th Dufferin Rifles of Brantford at the time the war broke out. He enlisted in November, 1914, and after a winter's training in camp at Toronto went overseas with the 19th Battalion. He served for nine months on the firing line with his regiment, and was invalided home in the latter part of 1916. After recovery from severe ear trouble, he joined the Machine Gun Corps, with which he served almost a year. He was then transferred to the First Canadian Tank Battalion and went overseas a second time, as Captain, in June, 1918, and had about three weeks of experience at the firing line with the British tanks.
3. Eric Morton; born January 23, 1896; was in his first year at McGill; enlisted early in 1916 with the Brantford Battery. He was accepted for a course at the Royal Artillery School, Kingston, where he qualified with high honors as Lieutenant. After a brief training at Petawawa Camp he was sent overseas to a further course at Woolwich, where he again took very high marks. He reached the firing line in October, 1916, and served there with great credit with the 2d and 4th Batteries and the 1st D.A.C. until the close of the war; and was in practically all the heavy battles during the last two and a half years, and finally accompanied the Canadian forces to Germany. He returned to Canada in May, 1919, and was discharged from service on arrival.

James Cockshutt, a manufacturer of Bradford York, and Colne Lanc. (son of J. & J. Cockshutt). Married, 1810, Mary Nightingale, a cousin of the celebrated Florence Nightingale and daughter-in-law of Benjamin Ingham, founder of that sect. Came to Canada 1827 in bark "Lady Digby" for Quebec; thence by stage to York, U. C. Established business there and later at Brantford (subsequently the I. & J. Cockshutt Co.). In 1840 re-visited England to pay off all business debts contracted through his failure in the cotton famine, previous to emigrating. Died Toronto 1866. Issue:

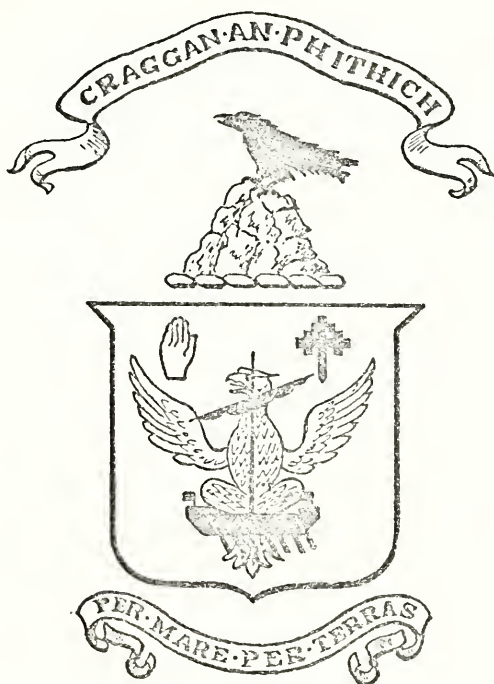

THE HON. ANGUS CLAUDE MACDONELL, K.C., Senator: Born Toronto, June 23, 1861. Educated at Model School; Trinity University (B.C.L., 1885; D.C.L., 1902); Ontario Law Society School. Barrister, 1884; K.C., 1908. Member of the law firm of Macdonell and Boland. M.P. for Toronto South, 1904-1917. Summoned to the Senate, 1917. Assisted in the establishment of the Catholic Register and The Barrister; is co-editor of The Canada Law List; always actively interested in amateur athletic and aquatic sports. Unmarried.

Clubs: Albany Club, Toronto Club, Toronto Hunt Club, Argonaut Rowing Club, Ontario Jockey Club, Empire Club, Royal Canadian Yacht Club, Rideau Club (Ottawa).

BRIG.-GEN. ARCHIBALD HAYES MACDONELL, C.M.G., D.S.O.; born Toronto, February 6, 1868. Joined the Active Militia in 1886, and the Permanent Force 1892. 2nd Lieutenant 10th Royal Grenadiers, 1889; 1st Lieutenant, 1890. Served in Boer War, 1899-1900, as Captain and Battalion Adjutant, two months, 2d Batt. Royal Canadian Regiment (D.S.O., Brevet Major and despatches twice). Served in South Nigeria (1901-4), on seven expeditions (despatches). Captain Royal Canadian Regiment, 1902; Major, 1905; Staff College, 1905-6, P.S.C.; Deputy Asst. Adjutant General of Maritime Provinces, 1907-8, and Deputy Asst. Quartermaster General of the same, 1908-10; Chief Staff Officer for the Western Ontario Command, 1910-11; Asst. Adjutant General, 1st Division, London, Ontario, 1911-3; Brevet Lieutenant Colonel, 1912; General Staff Officer, 1st Division, London, 1913-4; on General Staff, 1st Division, B.E.F., overseas, 1914-5; Lieutenant-Colonel, 1915; commanded the Royal Canadian Regiment, in the field in Flanders and France, 1915-6 (C.M.G. and despatches). Appointed April, 1916, to command 5th



Canadian Infantry Brigade, with rank of Brigadier-General; commanded his brigade in the field for 15 months. Despatches twice. Unmarried.

Patrick of Kingston and Ottawa.

WILLIAM POYNYS PATRICK (Note No. 1) of Bury St. Edmunds, Suffolk, England: Aged over 70 years, with his wife, Susannah, joined his son's emigration to America. He died in Kingston U.C. He had two sons,

2. Jermyn Poynts; born c. 1768; emigrated with his wife, Sarah (Oldham), in 1795, and died Kingston, 1810 (Note No. 2).

William Poynts Patrick (II) of Needham Market, Suffolk; married, 1780, Mary Prentice. They did not emigrate. Issue:

William Poynts Patrick (III); born Needham Market, 1786; came to America with his uncle, Jermyn. Mrs. Wilson does not mention him in her memoir; possibly he went to Kingston before the others. He was a watchmaker or silversmith. In 1810, at Kingston, he married Elizabeth Gilbert, born 1792, of Hubbardton, Vt. He was Staff-Sergeant in the 3d York, Upper Canada, Militia, and later held clerical office in the Government. In his earlier married life he lived at Scarborough; served in the Commissariat in the War of 1812. Issue, sons—

Crest: An arm in armour embowed proper.

Note 1.—The name Poyntz, or Poynts, was highly esteemed by earlier members of the family. Tradition ascribes it to a relationship with the family of Sir Stephen Poyntz, of Migden, Berks., whose daughter Georgiana, on her marriage in 1755, to the 1st Earl of Spencer, offered to buy her cousin Patrick a commission in the army, which he was obliged to decline through the lack of sufficient private means to support it; but in gratitude he named his son, Poyntz. Be that as it may, William Poynts Patrick, the first recorded here, was born several decades prior to 1755.

Note 2.—Jermyn Patrick's youngest daughter, the late Mrs. William Wilson of Kingston, in a memoir preserved by her daughter, Mrs. Julian Miles of Toronto, thus describes their experience: "My mother had two children when she left England, both girls; one died on the passage out. Smallpox broke out. My father with several others had chartered a vessel to bring out emigrants to farm in the United States. My father brought out six servants, and bought a farm a few miles out of Philadelphia, U. S., where he lived six years. One son and one daughter were born there. He spent all his money farming and could make nothing out of it; and when he tried to sell, he could not get a dollar for it. So disgusted he decided to go to Canada. He started for a place called Kingston, situated at the foot of Lake Ontario. They crossed the lake in a small batteau. Their boat leaked so much that they were obliged to land on an island, and remained there until they caulked the boat, which they did by tearing up their sheets. They had hired a pilot to take them to Kingston, but it being thirty years since he had been there, he had forgotten the way and they were lost. They saw some Indians in a canoe, paddling from them as fast as possible. The pilot said, 'Hold up a black bottle and they will come to you,' which they did. My father made them understand he wanted to go to Cataraqui, what Kingston was then called; and for a bottle of liquor, or 'fire-water,' as the Indians called it, they took them safely into the

harbour. My father having lost all his money, tried his hand at cleaning watches, but he did not succeed at that, so he turned to lumbering. The second raft was wrecked on the way to Montreal, and my father took cold, which settled on his lungs, and he died in 1810, only forty-two years old. He left my dear mother, with his father and mother, and four children, three daughters and one son. I, Sarah Ann Patrick, being born after they came to Kingston, was only three years old when my father died. My brother died when he was fourteen. She suffered such privations and hardships after my father's death and the war of 1812 breaking out, all communication between herself and her family ceased."

Gooderham of Toronto.

WILLIAM GOODERHAM, second son of James Gooderham of Scole, Co. Norfolk, England, was born 29th August, 1790, and died 20th August, 1881. In early life he was for some time in the army and served in the West Indies. He came to Canada in 1832. Married Harriet-Tovell Herring (born November, 1802; died 5th March, 1885), and had issue, with others:

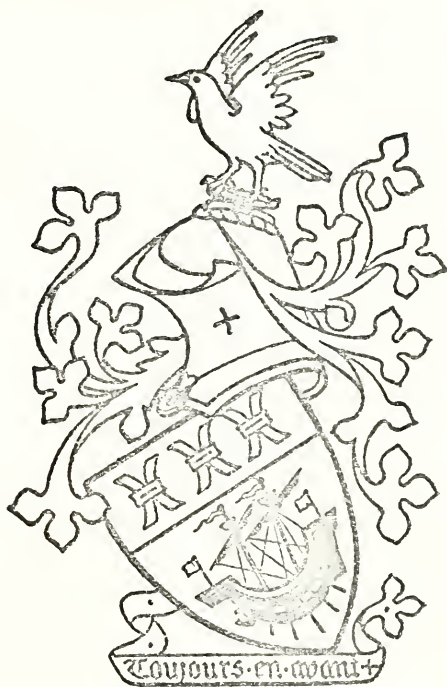

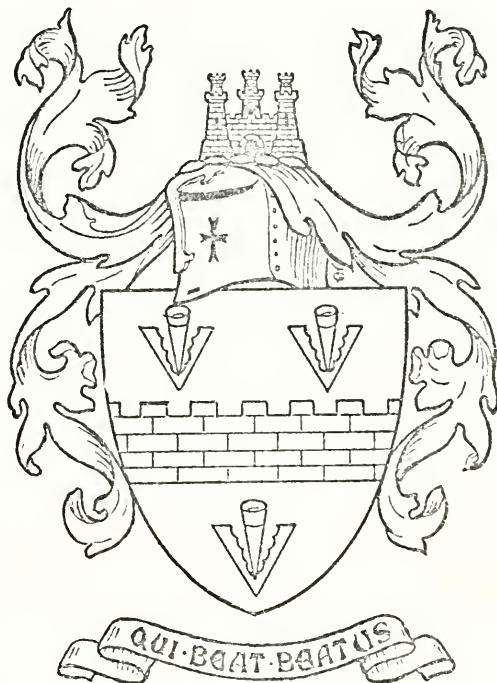

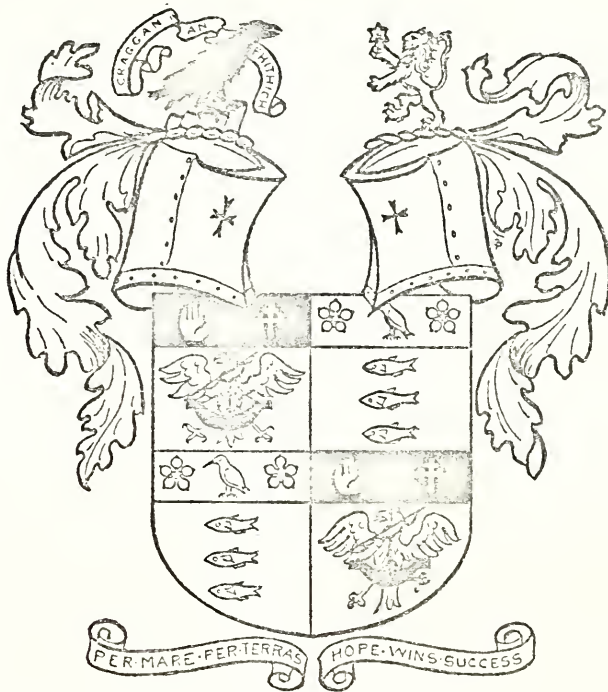

Viscount Monck

THE appointment of Lord Monck in 1861 to the office of Captain General and Governor in Chief of Canada was not favorably received by the Canadian press at the time, on the ground that he "was an inexperienced and unknown man, utterly unpracticed in any kind of statesmanlike work" to guide the Ship of State at the critical period of approaching Con-



federation. He was not long in office, however, when stirring events proved that he possessed all the ability necessary to meet the occasion. First came "The Trent affair," 1862, that raised bad blood in the country, and required wise and tactful administration. Then in 1864 a Ministerial crisis was brought about through parties being too evenly balanced in the House and the Government was defeated by two on a measure of vital importance to the country. On petition of the Ministry for dissolution, His Excellency, while expressing his willingness to abide by the advice of his ministers, set forth, in an able memorandum, the difficulties of the situation and advised a course that would avoid appealing to the electorate, where there seemed, through the excited condition of the country, but little chance of a satisfactory result. The wisdom of this advice the Ministry acknowledged and followed. Under his regime the plan of Confederation was worked out and accomplished in 1867, he becoming first Governor General; he relinquished office in 1868. (A. Hamlyn Todd.)

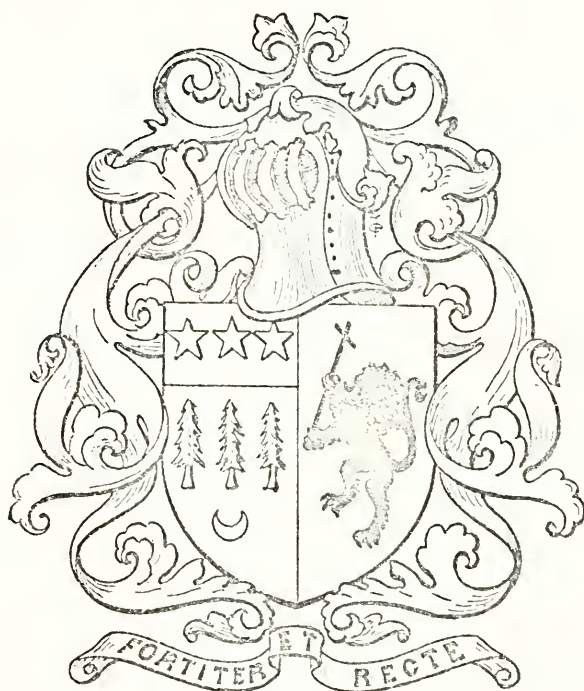

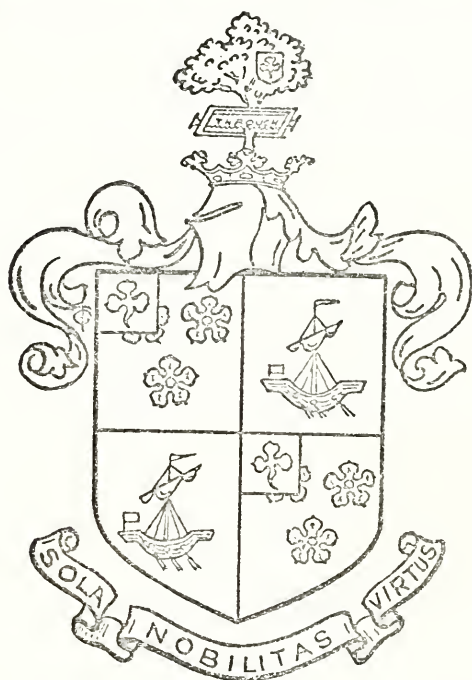

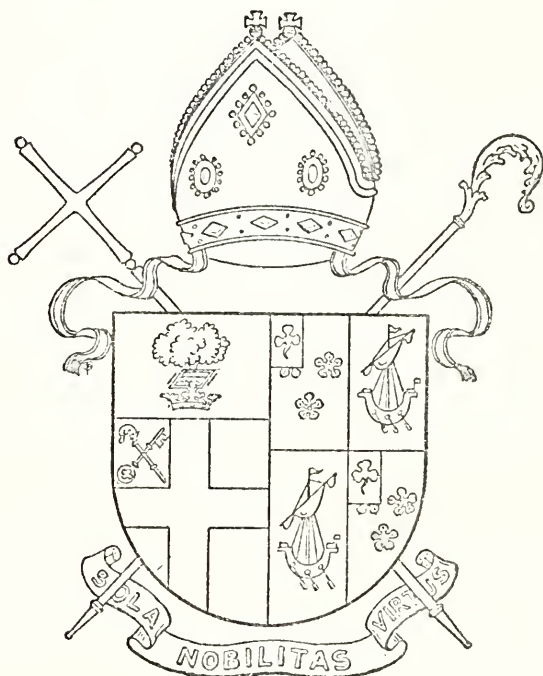

Perceiving his servant notice them, Sir Gilbert hastily called out: 'Through,' which word, with the oak and saw through it, he took for a crest to commemorate his deliverance."

Robert Rutherford of that Ilk, Laird of Edgerston, married Margaret Riddell of that Ilk. (4th son, Thomas, had a daughter married to Rutherford of Fairnington—another branch of the family.) Robert's son was

John Rutherford of that Ilk, Laird of Edgerston. In 1630 he raised a troop of Horse and fought for King Charles I, on the Isle of Wight, at Preston, and at Dunbar. He married Barbara Abernethy, daughter of the Bishop of Caithness by a daughter of Sir John Murray of Philiphaugh. Their son

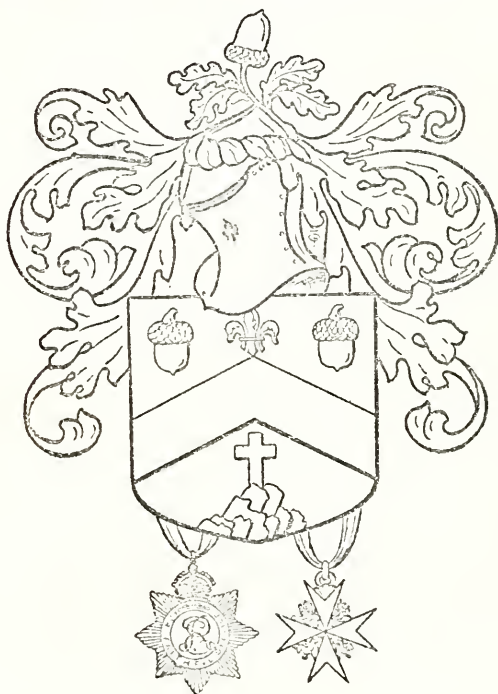

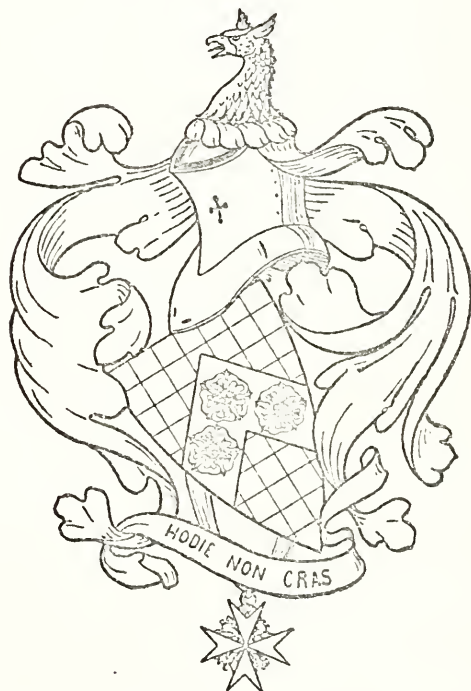

chairmen of the Federated Mining Institute; past vice-president of the American Institute of Mining Engineers; member of Canadian Mining Institute. Has contributed technical articles to mining publications. (*)

Alwyn, 2nd Earl of Lennox (circa 1130-1216), married Lady Eva (daughter of Gilchrist, 2nd Earl of Menteith). His son

Corc (circa 1195-1270), witnessed charter of his brother, Earl of Maldouen. His son Murdoch (circa 1235-1310), called Murdoch MacCorc, had a charter to the lands of Croy, afterwards called Croy-Leckie. His son

Duncan (circa 1270-1333) had lands of Rahane and Altermony in the Lennox; created Hereditary Sergeant of Dumbartonshire for services to Robert Bruce, King of Scotland. His son

Malcolm de Leky had a charter from King David II to lands of Leky (afterwards Leckie) formerly owned by King Robert Bruce; he was Hereditary Sergeant of Dumbarton-shire. His son

Murdoch de Leky (*circa* 1330-1405), of Leckie, Rahane, Altermony, etc. His son Murdoch de Leky (*circa* 1365-1445) had a confirmatory charter from King Robert III, of Rahane and Altermony, and a confirmatory charter from Robert, Duke of Albany, of Easter Lecky. He married Margaret Murray of the Kypmad family. His son

Sir Walter Lecky, or Leckie, fought for Charles VII and Joan of Arc, in France, against the English; he defeated the Duke of Bedford at Lagny in 1432. His son

Malcolm Leckie of that ilk (*circa* 1423-85), married (firstly) a daughter of Robert, Lord Fleming; the name of his second wife was probably Cuningham. By his first wife his son

James Leckie of that ilk (*circa* 1450-1514), had a son

Richard Leckie of that ilk (1475-1542), of Leckie, Rahane, Altermony, Letterbeg, etc.; was obligated to Margaret, Queen of Scots, for safe keeping of Doune Castle. His son

John Leckie of that ilk (*circa* 1500-47), of Leckie, Rahane, Altermony, Letterbeg, Drumfada, Stukleddy, etc., was one of a special bodyguard to Queen Mary, for whom he was fighting when killed at Pinkiecleugh, 10th September (He married daughter of Sir Ninian Seton of Touch and Tullibody.) His son

Walter Leckie of that ilk (1535-1605), sold Rahane and Altermony in 1579 to Donald Campbell of Drongie; he carried on a deadly feud with the Grahams under the Earl of Menteith—all the Leckies united to fight the Graham clan. He married (firstly) Agnes, daughter of William Cuningham of Glengarnok, and great-great-granddaughter of Princess Mary, daughter of Robert III. He married (secondly), 1597 (with consent of his son Alexander), Margaret, daughter of Alexander Livingston of Pantosken. His son by the first marriage

Alexander Leckie, of that ilk (*circa* 1560-1601), was murdered by Alexander Lindsay of Dunrod. He married Euphemia, daughter of George Maxwell of Newark. His son

Alexander Leckie, of that ilk, carried on the feud against the Maxwells and Lindsays, and finally dispossessed Alexander Lindsay, of Dunrod, of his estate. He married Grizel, daughter of Sir John Murray of Polmais. His son

John Leckie, last of that ilk (*circa* 1626-70), married Jean, daughter of Sir George Buchanan (and sister of John, the last Buchanan of that ilk). He lost the estate of Leckie, which was transferred to David Moir. His son

John Leckie was baptised in 1666. His son

Robert Leckie married Elspel Micklehouse. His son

John Leckie was baptised in 1716, and married Isobel Henderson. He died in Leckie before 1767. His son

Robert Leckie, born in Leckie, 1748; removed to Glasgow and there married Margaret Knox in 1784. His son

Robert Leckie, born 1797; married (firstly) Miss Dean; (secondly) Margaret, daughter of Captain John Gilmour; (thirdly) Jane Wright; he was a Justice of the Peace and a Baillie in Pollockshas. His son, by the second marriage, was

Another tradition based on a Gaelic poem by Murdoch Albanach (1180-1220) makes him 5th in descent from Lughaidh, King of Munster, Ireland.

William (Mr. Secretary) Jarvis (1756-1817), the founder of the family in Upper Canada. He married, 1785, Hanna Owen, daughter of the Rev. Samuel Peters, a loyalist; served as cornet in the first (American) Regiment or Queens Rangers Dragoons under Lieut. Col. John Graves Simcoe; he was wounded at Brandywine. On the withdrawal of the British troops from the American Colonies, he went to England, and took a commission in the Army; in 1792 was appointed Secretary and Registrar of Upper Canada—hence his appellation. He and his family sailed in the troopship "Henicker" to Sorel, Quebec, and were nearly wrecked. He settled at the new capital, Newark (Niagara-on-the-Lake). He was Grand Master Mason; all the early Masonic warrants in Ontario bear his signature and are known as the "Jarvis Warrants." He died in York. His son

Col. Samuel Peters Jarvis, who was second of the name, the first having died in youth, (1792-1857), born Newark, Upper Canada. He was noted, even when quite young, having been adopted as a Missisaga Indian; he was a famous shot. He married Mary Boyles, daughter of Hon. William Dummer Powell (q.v.). He practised law; was Clerk of the Crown in Chancery; and Chief Superintendent of Indian affairs. He served in the war of 1812, and was present at the taking of Detroit (medal and clasp) and at the battles of Queenston Heights, Lundy's Lane, and Stony Creek. After Stony Creek he was in command of the escort of the captured American General Winfield Scott, he saved the latter from being killed by the Indians. During the Rebellion of 1837, he raised and commanded another regiment of Queens Rangers, and was present at the affair of Montgomery's Tavern, and at the cutting out of the "Caro-

line" on the Niagara River. He was Judge Advocate in the trial of the Fenian prisoner General Sutherland. As a youth he shot a son of Surveyor General Ridout in a duel, near the N. W. corner of Yonge and College Sts., Toronto, but was exonerated on the field. He attacked William L. Mackenzie's printing office and threw the type into Toronto Bay, because of an article in the latter's paper on the "Family Compact," in which the female members of his family were introduced. Jarvis Street was named after him. He had five sons and four daughters. His eldest son

Maj. General Samuel Peters Jarvis (1820-1905) was educated for the law, but, owing to his being instrumental in saving the life of Lord Morpeth, while bathing in the Georgian Bay, he obtained through the latter, and by the help of Lord Wellington, a commission as Ensign in the Royal Canadian Rifle Regiment, but later exchanged to the 82d at Halifax, and served with it through the Indian Mutiny. He was at the Relief of Lucknow and many other engagements (medal, clasp, and brevet majority); was sometime Adjutant of the Staff college at Sandhurst. Retired from his regiment and accepted appointment as Assistant Adjutant General of the Militia in Canada with rank of Lieutenant Colonel. In the first Riel Rebellion he took command of the Ontario Battalion, and was in supreme command until the arrival of Lord Wolseley; was Commandant of the garrison at Fort Garry until the withdrawal of troops from Manitoba, when he was created a C. M. G. and gazetted, 1875, Colonel in the Imperial Army; in 1878 was sent on a special service to South Africa and was in command of the Colonial troops in the Kafir War (medal and clasp); later retired with rank of Major General. He married Rennee Wilson. He died at Bath without issue. His brother

William Dummer Powell (1821-69), a prominent barrister of Guelph, Ont., married Diana (daughter of the Hon. Jacob Æmelius Irving, Captain of the 13th Hussars). A good shot, and a noted swimmer; he swam across the Niagara River and back, just below the American Fall. Issue:

Baron Lisgar, 2nd Governor General of Canada.



SIR JOHN YOUNG (1807-76), 2nd baronet of Bailieborough Castle, Co. Cavan, was educated for the bar, to which he was called at the age of twenty-seven. In 1831 he entered political life, becoming member for Co. Cavan as a moderate Tory. In 1841 he was appointed a lord of the Treasury in Sir Robert Peel's ministry; and three years later became one of the Secretaries of the Treasury. In 1846 he was Chief Secretary for Ireland under Lord Aberdeen, and entered the Privy Council in 1852. In 1855 he was appointed Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands (G. C. M. G.)—then under a British protectorate—; and, in 1861, accepted the Governor Generalship of New South Wales, which office he held until 1867. In both the latter offices he was unfortunate, in that he left each under the cloud of official displeasure, caused rather by adverse and trying circumstances than by poor judgment. That the government appreciated these facts and had confidence in his abilities is attested by his being gazetted a G. C. B., and offered the governor-generalship of Canada—at a time, too, as events proved, when sound judgment was required.

It was, in a measure, due to those same misfortunes that Young determined to accept the Canadian office; for it had been tendered to Lord Mayo and others, who refused it, on the ground that "the Canadian government had impaired the dignity of the office by reducing the governor's salary." Sir John was appointed to the position, which included the governorship of Prince Edward Island—not then confederated—in 1869. The first year of his administration was darkened by the first Riel Rebellion. The following year he was created Baron Lisgar of Lisgar and Bailieborough. He resigned in 1872, and died four years later, when the barony became extinct.

That his short official life in Canada was successful is best evidenced, perhaps, by the following quotation from Pope's "Life of Sir John Macdonald:" "In Sir John Macdonald's opinion, Lord Lisgar was an ideal governor, the ablest of all those under whom he served; Sir John Young was a man of great sagacity, of large experience, and sound judgment. His single desire was to promote the best interests of the Dominion of Canada, and to his wise and prudent counsels Sir John Macdonald was greatly indebted" (Editor).

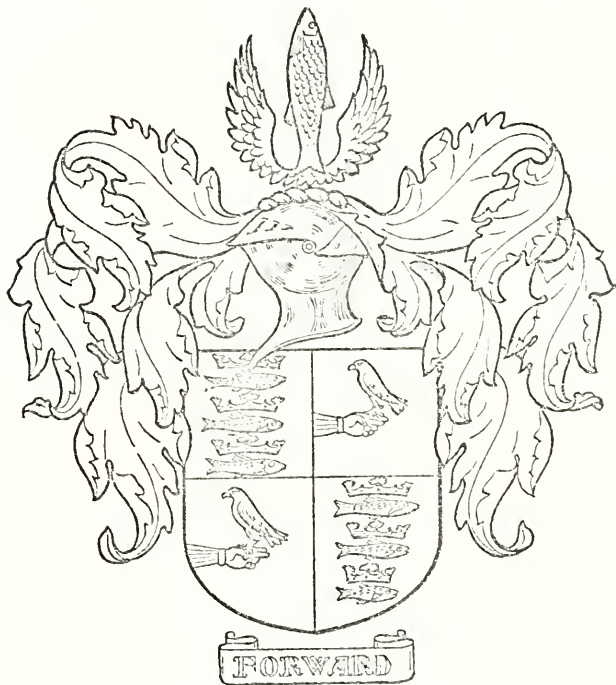

JOHN CHARLES ALISON HERIOT, born Georgeville, Que., Dec. 3, 1861; Architect by profession; member of firm of MacVicar and Heriot, architects of Montreal; holds special certificate in architecture, Cornell University; Captain, Retired List, Canadian

Militia; Member of the Antiquarian and Numismatic Society, and of the Art Association of Montreal. Unmarried.

"According to Longmuir's edition of Jamieson's Scottish dictionary, the word 'heriot' is derived from the Anglo-Saxon, and signified the tribute given to the lord of the manor for his better preparation for war; but came at length to denote the best beast, of whatever kind, which a tenant died possessed of, due to his superior after death. Professor Innes, in his work entitled, 'Concerning Some Scottish Surnames,' classes the surname 'Heriot' among those derived from places or lands. There is a parish and a river in it, both of the name of 'Heriot,' about twenty miles southeast of Edinburgh; also a small stream of the name in the parish of Cockburnspath, Berwickshire. The first notice believed to have been yet found of the name used as a surname is that of 'Willelmo de Heryt,' who was witness to a charter granted by King William the Lion, prior to 1214."

The Scottish historian, George Buchanan (1506-82), whose mother was Agnes Heriot, a daughter of the house of Trabroun, says that William Heriot and another aided in the escape of Robert, High Steward of Scotland, from Rothesay, whither he had fled from the English, after the battle of Halidon Hill (1333). The escape of the Steward, afterward Robert II., proved to be one of the most important events in Scottish history.

By a charter from Archibald, Earl of Douglas, in 1423, confirmed by James I. of Scotland, the lands of Trabroun, some 400 acres in East Lothian, were granted, for military service, to John Heriot, who is described as "squire and son to his confederate, James Heriot of Niddry Marischal." The estates were held in the family until the death of the last direct male heir in 1620.

At the marriage of Elizabeth, daughter of James Heriot, of Trabroun, to Sir Thomas Hamilton, of Priestfield (their son became 1st Earl of Haddington), was a witness,

John Charles Heriot (circ. 1795-1825), born London, Eng.; Lieutenant in the Hon. East India Company's Service; he married in India, where he and his wife died about the same time, leaving two children, who were sent to England; the elder, Sophia (1818-25), sailed with her nurse; they perished in the wreck of the vessel—all records of the marriage being lost; the younger child

John Charles Heriot, Jr. (1819-91), born in the Presidency of Madras, India; he owed his life to the fact that he was kidnapped by natives for a ransom, on the eve of the sailing of the ill-fated vessel; he was found shortly after and sent home by another ship. Gentleman; came to Canada 1848; resided at Georgeville, Quebec, and at the "Hermitage," Lake Memphremagog. George Heriot, the banker-jeweller of James I.'s reign, the founder of Heriot's Hospital, Edinburgh, and the prototype of the character of that name in Sir Walter Scott's "Fortunes of Nigel," was also a descendant of the Heriots of Trabroun.

"Magna Britannica" states that the name Durnford, which was anciently spelled "de Derneford," derives its name from a village in Normandy; that the family received for its services at the battle of Hastings, grants of land in Devon and Cornwall, including Rame Head, acquired by marriage with the daughter of Rame of Rame. The branch described below has for centuries borne the ram's head for arms. According to tradition the family came over with William the Conqueror. There are lands in North Cadbury, Somersetshire, still called "Durnford's Grounds." The parish registers of North Cadbury shew that toward the end of the 16th century one of the church wardens was William Durnford. It is likely that he was a descendant of that William Durnford who died about the middle of the 15th century, possessed of various manors in Somersetshire. His son

Philip Durnford (1804-81), born at Dungannon Fort. Captain, H. M. S. 68th Regiment; later Collector, Inland Revenue, Montreal. Married Augusta, daughter of Stephen Sewell, K. C.; Solicitor General for Lower Canada, a U. E. Loyalist from Boston, Mass. Issue:

ARCHIBALD CAMERON MACDONELL, C.M.G., D.S.O., Brigadier-General: Born Windsor, Ont., Oct. 6, 1864; graduate of Kingston Military College; served with distinction in the Boer War (D.S.O.), severely wounded (see "Canadian Men and Women of the Time—1912"); succeeded to the command of Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadians), 1912; also in command of the Royal School of Instruction, Winnipeg. With his command he left Valcartier for England in 1914; where his regiment was brigaded with the Royal Canadian Dragoons, and the 2nd King Edward's Horse. The brigade volunteered for trench service in France without horses; arriving in May, 1915. Fought at the battle of Festubert, where Strathcona's Horse lost nearly one-third of its effective force in trench warfare (three days' battle). In December, 1915, Lt.-Col. Macdonell accepted command of the 7th Canadian Infantry Brigade, with rank of Brigadier-General; the brigade consisting of the Royal Canadian Regiment, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, 49th Edmonton Regiment, with machine gun, and trench mortar batteries. Was mentioned in despatches, January, 1916 (C.M.G.). In February he was shot twice in arm and shoulder while visiting an advance gun-post. He resumed command two months later. In June his brigade was warmly commended for holding their line under heavy losses, and again for action in September.

Note: Col. John Thomas Campbell served with the 72nd Highlanders, and saw active service in the Crimea as an Ensign, being wounded in the trenches before Sebastopol; served with the Royal Fusiliers, and later with the Royal Canadian Rifles. His father was Thomas Campbell, and his mother was a daughter of the Campbells of Glendarnel, Argyllshire. The families were not related.

Lineage.

John Macdonell, received a tack of Leek in 1661; he is supposed to have been Ian Mor (John the Elder), a younger son of Donald Macdonell 7th of Glengarry, who died, 1645, aged one hundred years, and his wife, Margaret, daughter of Allan Macdonald 9th of Clanranald.

Ranald Macdonell received a tack of Leek in 1690; he married a daughter of Chief Grant of Glenmoriston and had two sons, Alexander of Leek, and John. The elder, Alexander, signed an address to George I in 1714; he is said to have had four sons, viz.: Angus, Ranald, John and Donald; there is some uncertainty here. Leek was held by a John Macdonell early in the eighteenth century, but whether he was John son of Ranald, or John son of Alexander is not known. He had three sons, all of whom were in the ill-fated army of Prince Charles Edward, the "Young Pretender."

John of Leek, who married Jean, daughter of Alexander Chisholm of Mackerach, and niece of Roderick Chief of the Clan Chisholm, and had six sons and four daughters; he followed his sons and brothers to America. His eldest son, Angus, died unmarried. His younger son, Archibald, in the break-up of the Highland families after 1745, emigrated to America and settled in New York, being the pioneer of the extensive emigration in 1773 of Macdonells and others who settled in the Mohawk Valley under the leadership of Allan of Collachie (below), Alexander of Aberchalder, and another, probably "Spanish John" of the Scottus branch of Glengarry.

Allan Macdonell of Collachie, after 1745, went to France; entered the French service; rose to the rank of Captain, serving for ten years; he then emigrated to America, as stated above. Served in the Revolutionary War as Captain in the Royal Highland Emigrant regiment, his commission being dated 14th June, 1775. He was made prisoner, but escaped, and reached Quebec in 1779. He was then too old for further military service. He married Helen, daughter of the Mac Nab; he died 1792, aged eighty. Issue, sons—1. Angus (U.E.L.); unmarried; lost in the wreck of the "Speedy" on Lake Ontario, 1804.

Came to Canada; was Sheriff in the Home District, 1792-1803; member for Glengarry in the Legislative Assembly; speaker in 1804; subsequently member of Legislative Council; Colonel of Militia, 1812; taken prisoner by Americans, and held until the end of the war. He married Ann, daughter of James Smith, and sister of the Hon. Samuel Smith (Colonel of the Queen's Rangers; M.L.C., and twice Administrator of the Government of Upper Canada). Issue,

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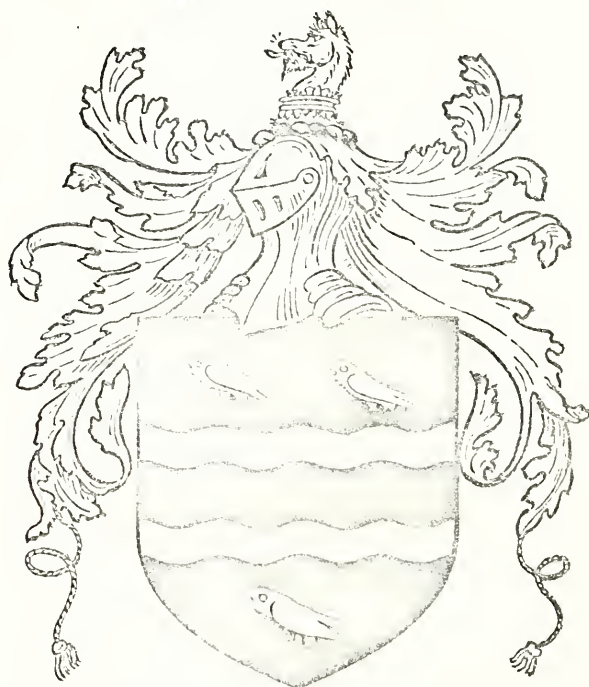

ALFRED TODD (deceased), of the Civil Service, Ottawa, was born March 15, 1819, at Halsted, Essex County, England; came to Canada with his mother and his brother Alpheus' (q.v.); entered the Civil Service of Canada and rose to the position of Chief Clerk of the Private Bills Office, and of Clerk Assistant of the House. At the incendiary fire which destroyed the Parliamentary Buildings in Montreal in 1849, he, at the risk of his life, and with the assistance of Sandford Fleming (see Sir Sandford Fleming), and Thomas Vaux (see Vaux of Brockville), saved the life-sized portrait of Her late Majesty Queen Victoria (note No. 1).

He married, Toronto, 1843, Catherine (daughter of Patrick Hartney and Mary Turner, his wife, of that city). He died, Ottawa, June 6, 1874; she died, Ottawa, Feb. 2, 1901. Issue,

TODD, ALPHEUS, C.M.G.; LL.D. (†) (deceased), Librarian of Parliamentary Library, Ottawa. Born in London, England, 30 July, 1821. Came to Canada with parents when eleven years old. In 1834 at the age of thirteen he drew and published the first map of Toronto, then York. When fifteen years of age (1836) he entered the public service as Assistant to the Librarian of the Upper Canada Legislature at Toronto. Promoted to the full charge of the Parliamentary Library in 1856. Made Honorary Doctor of Laws by Queen's University 1881, and the same year C. M. G. Author of the following works: "Practice and Privileges of the Two Houses of Parliament" (1840), "Parliamentary Government in England" (1866-9), "Parliamentary Government in the Colonies" (1880). As a Constitutional authority, acknowledged throughout the British Empire, covering a long period of his life, and up to the time of his death, he was much consulted in and outside of Canada by Governors and Ministers, for his opinion on legislative difficulties, as they arose, in the different Colonies. To this fact the Parliamentary papers of Australasia amply testify.

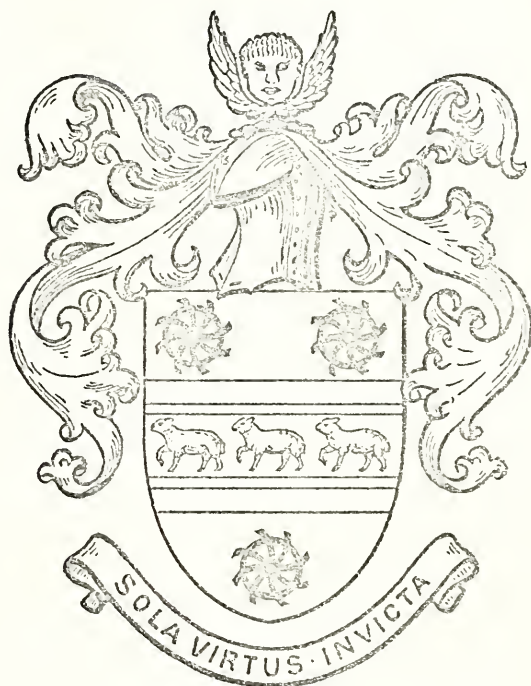

Lineage.

It is a well-known fact that many families of Scott trace their descent from the Baliols. Sir William Baliol, a younger brother of John Baliol, King of Scotland, about the end of the thirteenth, or beginning of the fourteenth century, to avoid being drawn into the ruin which overtook his royal brother, changed his name to Le Scot, the name of his mother, who was Margaret Le Scot, Countess of Huntington. Among the numerous branches who claim descent from him are the Scotts of Great Barr in Staffordshire who have been settled in that vicinity from the reign of Edward I. The head of the house, Sir Joseph Scott, high Sheriff of Staffordshire, M.P. for Worcester, was created a baronet in 1806. And the present holder of the title is the seventh baronet.

One Richard Scott of the Great Barr family was one of the "Gentlemen Adventurers" who financed Cromwell's war in Ireland, and went there during the "settlement." His son, Angel Scott, acquired the Cahiracon estate from the Earl of Thomond and was the founder of the Scotts of Cahiracon who held that estate until 1850.

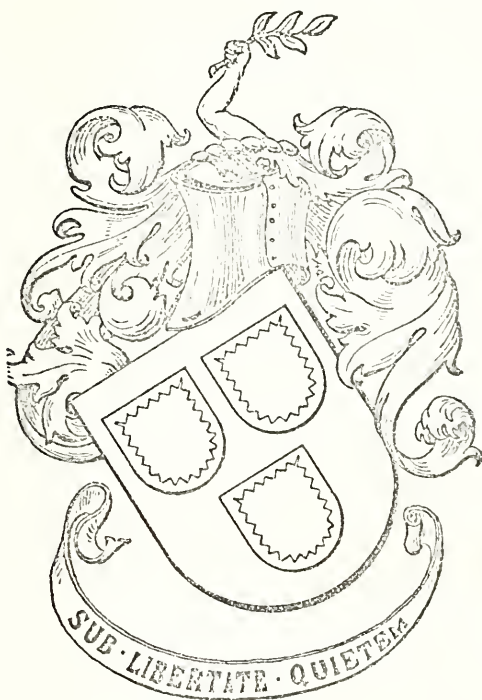

Lieut.-Col. Stephen Burritt was born in New England; he entered the British Army at nineteen and served seven years. He was dispatch writer for Col. Barry St. Leger, Commandant of the Royal forces in Canada. He was wounded at Gage's Hill, was present at the taking of Fort Edward and at the surrender of Burgoyne. After the war he and his brother Daniel settled on the upper St. Lawrence with other discharged soldiers. In 1793 he penetrated the woods thirty miles and founded Burritts Rapids, where he died; he being the first white man to explore and settle on the North Bank of the Rideau River. His chopping attracted a Mohawk Indian, who ordered him off the hunting grounds of the tribe. After a desperate struggle he downed the Indian and threatened to brain him. Note 1. Elihu Burritt (1810-79) famous as the "learned blacksmith," was so called because he was brought up to, and for many years worked at that trade both in New Britain, Conn., where he was born, and later in Worcester, Mass., but devoted all his spare time to mathematics and to mastering not only the dead languages and the principal modern languages, but some of the difficult Eastern tongues, such as Arabic. But he was best known for his energy in advocating "Universal Brotherhood," in furthering which he travelled through Europe and America, taking part in several peace conferences. He was the author of several works on the subject. From 1865-70 he was U. S. Consul at Birmingham, England.

Note 2. This blazon is similar to that of the Burrell family, which may account for a tradition in the Burritt family that the name had been different originally. The latter name seems to be unknown in the British Isles.

Armorial Miscellany

DOMINION OF CANADA. Arms: Quarterly of the arms of the first four provinces to enter confederation, viz.: 1. Ontario. 2. Quebec. 3. Nova Scotia. 4. New Brunswick. No crest, motto, nor supporters. (See note.)

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO. Arms: Vert, a sprig of three leaves of maple slipped or, on a chief argent the cross of St. George.

Crest: A bear passant sable. Motto: *Ut inceptis fidelis sic permanet.*
Supporters: Dexter a moose, sinister a Canadian deer both proper.

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC. Arms: Or a fesse gules charged with a lion passant guardant or, accompanied in chief by two fleurs-de-lis azure and by three maple leaves vert, stalked in point. (The following complements have been approved, 1918, by the Numismatic and Antiquarian Society of Montreal, but no other official action has been taken. Crest: A beaver passant proper. Motto: *Je me souviens.* Supporters: Dexter an eastern Indian holding in his outer hand a bow; sinister an early settler holding in his outer hand an axe, all proper.

PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA. (Royal Warrant, 1868.) Arms: Or on a fesse wavy azure between three thistles proper a salmon naiant argent.

PROVINCE OF NEW BRUNSWICK. Arms: Or on waves a lymphad with oars in action proper, on a chief gules a lion passant guardant or.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA. Arms: Argent three bars wavy azure, issuant from the base a demi-sun in splendour proper, on a chief the union device charged in the centre point with an antique crown or. (The foregoing is by Royal warrant, the following complements were added by provincial Order-in-Council dated 25th May, 1911, for use in the great seal of the province.) Crest: Upon an imperial crown proper a lion statant guardant imperially crowned all or. Motto: *Splendor sine occasu.* Supporters: Dexter a Wapiti stag; Sinister a ram of the *Ovis Montana* all proper.

PROVINCE OF MANITOBA. Arms: Vert on a rock a buffalo statant proper, on a chief argent the cross of St. George.

Note: It has been the custom to surround the arms of the Dominion with a wreath and surmount it with a crown; such embellishments should not be encouraged as they are absolutely without official warrant. The use of an esquire's helmet in official arms with suitable mantle is a legitimate complement to the escutcheon.

PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND. (Royal Warrant 1905.)

Arms: Argent on an Island vert, to the sinister an oak-tree fructed, to the dexter thereof three oak saplings sprouting all proper, on a chief gules a lion passant guardant or. Motto (adopted): *Parva sub ingenti.*

PROVINCE OF ALBERTA. Arms: Azure in front of a range of snow mountains proper, a range of hills vert, in base a wheat field surmounted by a prairie both also proper, on a chief argent the cross of St. George.

PROVINCE OF SASKATCHEWAN. Arms: Vert three garbs in fesse or, on a chief of the last a lion passant guardant gules.

YUKON TERRITORY. (In use several years, but without official authority.) Arms: Azure three piles issuing from the base gules fimbriated argent each charged with three bezants in pale, on a chief indented a lion passant gules.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES. (In use several years without official authority.) Arms: Argent four garbs proper, on a chief vair a polar bear passant also proper.

PROPOSED NEW ARMS FOR THE DOMINION OF CANADA.

(As blazoned in two memorials to the Governor General presented concurrently from Toronto and Montreal signed by several prominent persons.) Azure between in chief two maple leaves stalked and in base a fleur-de-lis, a lion passant guardant or. Crest: Upon an imperial crown, a moose, to surround statant sable attired and enguled or. Motto: *Dieu protege le Roy.*

Supporters: Two Canadian Indians outwardly guardant habited in deerskins and mocassins and with adornments of wampum variously coloured and disposed all proper excepting the dexter to be of the west, in his right hand a tomahawk with scalplocks pendant, headdress of feathers, red yoked tunic with jagged ends, seamed at the sides, deerskin leggings fringed with ermine skins; the sinister to be of the east, bareheaded, wearing a single feather semi-erect, in his left hand a calumet, tunic belted and fringed, leggings of blue cloth, necklaces of wampum and bear's claws.

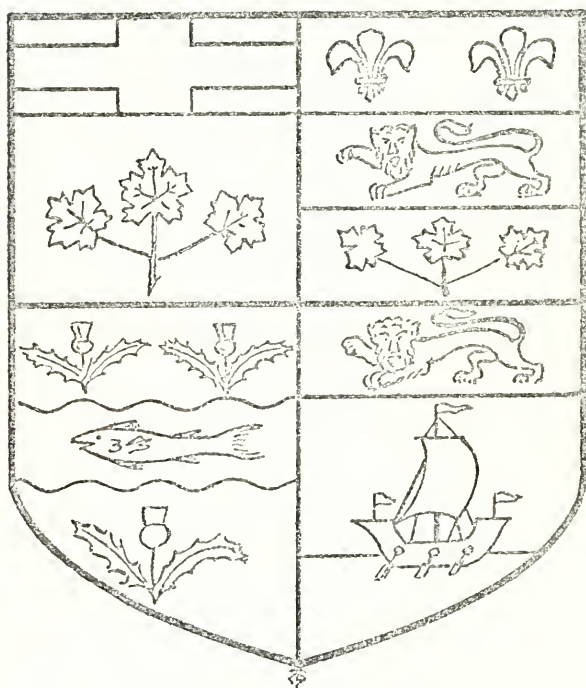
The design was a compromise, after a lengthy correspondence of four contributed as follows: (Fig. 1. Crest: A bear passant proper. Supporters: Indians) by Major E. M. Chadwick, K. C., of Toronto, probably the best living authority on Canadian armorials; (Fig. 2. Supporters: Bison and Polar Bear) by Mr. George Todd of Yonkers, N. Y.

TOWN OF ANNAPOLIS ROYAL N. S. Arms: (re-designed from the town seal by Mr. George Todd at the request of Mr. L. M. Fortier, Hon. Curator of Fort Ann; adopted by the Town Council 1918), 1, 2 and 3 quarters as in the royal arms, 4 gules, 3 fleur-de-lis or. (From the arms of France under the Bourbons; the change of the field from azure to gules signifying the British Conquest). Crest: On a wreath or and gules a branch alternately leaved and flowered of roses and thistles; surrounding the shield a buckled ribbon bearing the words "Annapolis Royal N. S."

TOWN OF DRUMMONDVILLE, QUE. Arms: (developed from the arms of Maj. Gen. the Hon. Frederick George Heriot, C. B. (1786-1843), founder of the town, adopted by the Town Council, 1918, on the one hundredth anniversary as a tribute to the founder). Quarterly, 1 and 4 argent on a fesse azure three cinquefoils of the first, 2 and 3 ermine two bars gules. Crest: A dexter hand couped at the wrist holding a laurel wreath all proper. Motto: (over the crest), *Fortem posce animum.* On a compartment a beaver on a log between in dexter a sprig leaved and flowered with a rose, thistle and shamrock, in sinister, a sprig of three maple leaves. On a ribbon beneath the words "Drummondville Que."

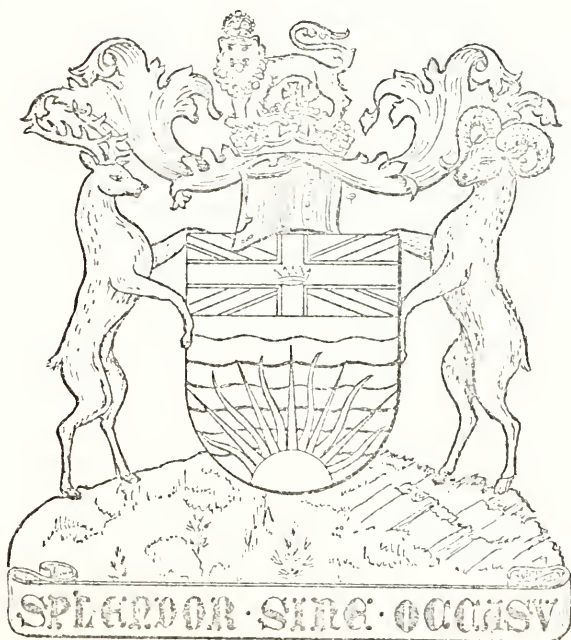
